



How to find and apply to shows

I'm new to the industry. How do I apply to shows?

The NAIA has surveyed professional artists on how they find new shows to apply to. Most artists who responded use multiple sources, but the most common one is word of mouth. Speaking with artists you know or meet at shows is often the best way to find new shows, and visiting a local show can be a good way to gather information.

The most commonly cited sources of new shows after word of mouth were:

- **Zapplication**
 - Free to view applications, most shows charge a fee to apply
 - A widely used online jurying program for art shows. Zapplication lists only shows that use their jurying procedure but the list includes hundreds of events.
- **Juried Art Services**
 - Free to view applications, most shows charge a fee to apply
 - A common online jurying system and is used by several well known shows like Crafts America shows, the Smithsonian Craft Show, the Northern Virginia (Reston) show. Again, the website contains a list of shows that use their jurying procedure.
